Service quality is the overall assessment of a service by the customer (Eshighi, Roy & Ganguli, 2008). Organizations over the years have also regarded perceived service quality as a strategic tool for positioning as well as means of achieving operational efficiency and improving business performance (Mehta, Laiwan & Han 2004). No doubt,

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satisfied customers are more willing to pay for the benefits they receive and may tolerate increase in price.

Previous studies have looked at service delivery in different organisations, but little has been done on service delivery in the electricity industries. This paper therefore provides an overview of existing and new research relating to service, service delivery in relation to how it can be used to improve power supply and in turn provide economic development .

#### 2. Literature Review

Service amongst many definitions could be seen economic activities that create value and provide benefits for customers at specific times and places, as a result of bringing about a desired change in or on behalf of the recipient of the service. It is also an activity that is intangible, it is not stored and does not result toownership, it is one of the two key component of marketing. Service should be approached from the customers perspective because it is the customers total perception of the outcome which generated through a process (Edvardsson 1998). A poor service or a service failure will result in dissatisfaction and this in turn will prompt a variety of responses which may include complaining, negative word-of-mouth and decisions not to repurchase. If it is impossible to avoid service failures and dissatisfaction, then it becomes increasingly important for organisations to understand how to manage such occurrences and minimise their adverse effects. (Christine Ennew& Klaus Schoefer, 2003). There is increasing evidence to suggest that effective service recovery will generate a range of positive customer responses with complaint handling being seen as a key element in service recovery. Responding effectively to consumer complaints can have a significant impact on satisfaction, repurchase intentions and the spread of word-of-mouth. On the other hand, Service quality is a dynamic state associated with products, services, people, processes and environments that meets or exceeds expectations and help produce superior value (Goetsch & Davies, 2010). It is a degree of excellence. It is important to note that perception of quality is not static and may change with customer's experiences and view of the world.

However service quality is the overall assessment of a service by the customer (Eshighii, Roy & Ganguli, 2008). Intangible elements of service includes inseparability, heterogeneity and perishability which are critical determinants influencing service quality perceived by a customer (Douglas & Connor, 2003). Companies should be able to define what service quality means to them in other to deliver services with higher quality level, in order to increase customer satisfaction. Many researchers have also showed that service quality perceived by customers will directly influence customer satisfaction as well as their trust in the service firm. (Parasuraman *et al.*, 1988; Aydin & Ozer, 2005; Ismail *et al.*, 2006). Service quality is not only involved in the final product and service, but also involved in the production and delivery process (Kumra, 2008). Service delivery is concerned with where, "when, and ho w the service product is delivered to the customer. Having a service company is synonymous with delivering excellent service.

The success of a product support strategy depends on how effectively these services are delivered, and in designing the service delivery system, companies should focus on what creates value to them and how to engage frontline employees to deliver the customer experience. It cannot be overemphasized that in the service delivery system, it is the people that make the

difference. Service from one person to another would vary even with the same product features, therefore there is a need for an integrated service marketing approach that will seek to provide uniform service, as well as creating the convenient environment for customers to do business. There are many approaches to delivering service quality, but they all start with understanding what the key elements are. five dimensions of service quality
